Services), SOMOS has pioneered a website dedicated to the education and training for disaster relief. LtCol Benjamin Kam and COL Tad Gerlinger have been instrumental in spearheading the efforts to stand up the first website dedicated to the care of the wounded in austere environments and training to assist all those who are providing orthopaedic care in the face of natural disasters or other conflicts. #### News from the Front

Bagram AF, Afghanistan – January, 2011

The Craig Joint Theater Hospital at Bagram Air Field is a Role 3 facility which currently functions as the hub for evacuation of casualties in the Afghan theater. Most casualties stop at Bagram prior to departure to Landstuhl en route to CONUS, and the hospital is staffed with three orthopaedic surgeons. The mission is to provide acute and sub-acute trauma to US and NATO casualties as they pass through, as well as definitive management of combat extremity wounds for local national civilians, Afghan Army and Police forces, and detained personnel.

Unfortunately, the tempo of orthopaedic casualties has remained high, and with a seemingly higher level of acuity than seen in the Iraqi theater. This increase in injury severity, particularly two and three extremity amputees, is likely resultant from an increased percentage of blast injuries to soldiers on foot, rather than in vehicles. The signature injury we have seen since the "surge" in Afghanistan, is the bilateral high transfemoral amputee with associated abdominal injury, and wounds extending into the perineum and groin. In November and December, 2010, 272 orthopaedic cases were performed: 139 on US and coalition troops, and 133 on Afghan nationals. Among the latter are acetabular fractures, pilon fractures, calcaneus fractures, distal humerus fractures, non-union and deformity surgery, and circular external fixation cases.
