Welcome Your New Army Consultant

After many years of serving as the Orthopaedic Consultant to the US Army Surgeon General, , COL James Ficke, MD has retired from Army service. SOMOS would like to thank him for his assitance and services!

Stepping in to fill COL Ficke's shoes is COL Philip J. Belmont Jr. MD. COL Belmont is a Distinguished Graduate of the United States Military Academy in West Point, New York. He graduated from the Duke University School of Medicine and completed his internship and orthopaedic surgery residency at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. COL Belmont then completed an Adult Reconstruction Fellowship at the Anderson Clinic in Alexandria, Virginia.

He is currently an Associate Professor of Surgery (Orthopaedics) at the Uniformed Services University. He served as an orthopaedic surgeon with the 228th Combat Support Hospital in Iraq and has been the Program Director of the William Beaumont Army Medical Center /Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Orthopaedic Surgery Residency Program at William Beaumont Army Medical Center, El Paso, Texas since 2007.

COL Belmont has been continually involved in research relating to musculoskeletal care of military service members and total joint arthroplasty. Dr. Belmont has over 50 peer-reviewed publications in international journals and over 100 podium/poster presentations.

His work as a co-author has been awarded the 2002 Hibbs Basic Science Research Award at the Scoliosis Research Society, outstanding clinical science research for the 2003 Bailey K. Ashford Award, outstanding paper for the 2003 Eastern and Southern Orthopaedic Association Annual Meeting and 2013 Texas Orthopaedic Association and Founder's Award for the 2009 Society of Military Orthopaedic Surgeons.

Additionally, COL Belmont co-edited the text Combat Orthopedic Surgery: Lessons Learned in Iraq and Afghanistan which was designed to address the need for an evidence-based resource that prepares military orthopedic surgeons facing deploying to today's combat zones. COL Belmont also serves as an Associate Editor for the Journal of Surgical Orthopaedic Advances and is a Reviewer for the Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery.

NAVY

Greetings Naval Orthopaedic Colleagues,

Thank you to all for what you do everyday. Due to our success, Navy Orthopedic Surgeons continue to be in high demand throughout the world, including on the battlefield. In 2012, 45% of our community was deployed at one time or another, and I am happy to announce the taskers for support on the war on terrorism continue to decline. The Navy Surgeon General stated last year, "As long as Kandahar is open, it will be a Navy mission." However, requests to support the US Marines, Navy Fleet Hospitals, IA billets, and reserve billets have greatly decreased. Mission taskers for January have already been assigned, so if you want to deploy, now is the time to let your chain of command know you are volunteering!

The season for interviews and applications for Orthopedic internship, residency, and fellowship has started. The precept for the GMESB has been released, and all are encouraged to review this document. Attempts at increasing the number of residents and fellows are underway as at the moment these are limited. Every type of specialty will be required in the near future, so if interested in a training spot, be sure to apply.

Work is being done to hold the Combat Extremity Surgical Course (CESC) during the same time as SOMOS once again this year. The CESC has been a required course for all Navy Orthopedic Surgeons and Physician Assis-

tants every three years, with priority for those soon to deploy. Request for central funding for FY2014 has been submitted.

Finally, funding for the SOMOS Annual Meeting has been submitted to BUMED and the Secretary of Navy for approval. Last year the meeting was approved the day the meeting began; lets hope this year approval comes much sooner! SOMOS will once again have high caliber research projects presented, guest lectures, case reviews, and case controversies. It is also a good time to discuss deployments, personal career progression, and upcoming PCS's.

Greetings Army Orthopaedic Colleagues,

I would first like to thank each and every one of the hard-working and dedicated group of nearly 250 Army orthopaedic surgeons and residents who continually provide expert clinical care to those military service members whether they are deployed overseas or at home.

We are in 12th year of the Afghanistan War and the operational tempo for orthopaedic surgery deployments has continued to remain high as we currently have ten active-duty orthopaedic surgeons deployed to

Afghanistan. I would like to personally recognize the nearly 30 orthopaedic surgeons who have deployed over the past year for your faithful service and representing Army Orthopaedic Surgery in a positive light by delivering excellent care to our warriors and their family members.

The coming year of 2014 will hopefully see the operational requirements for deployments for orthopaedic surgery decline but as long as there are soldiers deployed overseas our clinical expertise will be needed.

This year there are 19 orthopaedic surgery residency and 9 orthopaedic surgery fellowship positions available. The competition for Army orthopaedic surgery residency positions has been intense, with an average of 1.47 medical school applicants per orthopaedic surgery position during the years 2007-2011.

For orthopaedic surgeons interested in competing for a sponsored subspecialty fellowship training program in Hand, Sports, Spine, Foot and Ankle and Adult Reconstruction please apply through the Army GME website (https://education.mods.army.mil/ meded/userLogon/UserLogon.asp). It is imperative to stay up to date on submission deadlines for this system and to recheck submissions on a regular basis. I encourage all interested applicants for residency or fellowship positions to apply and to contact me personally if they have any questions.

The Army continues to enjoy continued success in its collaborative activities with SOMOS in putting on continued on page 6

I would urge each facility to rank list members of your department and 'volunteer' as taskings are released.

Interviews and applications for Orthopedic residency, and fellowship have been completed and we have been blessed with an abundance of fellowship positions with outstanding applicants. Manning documents have been adjusted to provide equivalent fellowship opportunities to our civilian counterparts. I hope that each of you gets the chance to apply for and enter a fellowship of your choosing.

Conference submission and approval continues to be a frustrating endeavor. Packages for SOMOS and AAOS have been entered and are awaiting review and approval. I am cautiously optimistic that each will be approved at the last minute. However, alternate means of attendance to SOMOS are being sought.
